


Thomas Valles is portrayed as the troubled teen in the movie McFarland USA and also the number one runner for the 1987 State Championship Cross Country team.

After graduating from McFarland High School in 1988, Mr. Valles continued his running career at College of the Sequoias and California State University Bakersfield. He remains involved with the sport through coaching. A former member of the United States Coast Guard, Mr. Valles has been employed by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation for nearly two decades. He and his wife, Martha, have three children.

Mr. Valles now shares his message of perseverance, dedication, and success to thousands of elementary, middle, and high school students, college students, business owners, and crowds across the nation. He works to inspire and to connect by sharing the message that "Champions can come from anywhere." while sharing the vision that anything is possible as it is, "All in the attitude."

Opening General Session Keynote Speaker Wednesday, November 17, 2021 Raised in Southeastern New Mexico and West Texas, Rojélio Viramontez is one of seven brothers and sisters born to Leopoldo Diaz Viramontez and Eloisa Garcia Anguiano. The seed of his passion for dance was planted as early as high school years. Dance was not only his passion but the sheer escape from the realities he faced each day coming from a low income family living in the projects of Southeastern NM and West Texas. His passion towards dance allowed him to perceive and feel dance as more than just movement. It was also a cultural, historical, and powerful method to deliver a message for inspiration and motivation that can help change lives.

Through his life experience, education, and dance career, Rojélio developed a unique music and dance program that expands from the social emotional to multicultural focuses in the areas of International Ballroom, Latin, Swing, Country Western, and Folk. This program has been successfully implemented in over 15 states with some of the largest school districts including Los Angeles, San Francisco, Dallas, San Antonio, and Miami to some of the smallest districts in America. His program has been presented within the migrant community at state and national conferences, parent conferences, teen conferences and in the form of summer camps.

Leonard Beles, ESC-8, Administrator



Leonard Beles started his journey with the migrant world as a migratory student at Como-Pickton CISD. After high school graduation, he attended Texas A&M Commerce, earning his bachelor's degree. After teaching for several years, Mr. Beles joined Region 8 ESC as the Bilingual/ESL/Migrant Consultant. He lnow serves as Director of State and Federal Programs at Region 8 ESC. Even after becoming a federal programs director, he continues to work with migratory families. In addition to his role of director, he maintains a special connection to the Migrant Education Program through managing the Region 8 ESC MEP SSA districts, serving as the AMET Regional Director, sharing his expertise on various TEA focus groups, and presenting at the state level about the importance of literacy in the home. He is a lifelong learner and always has a book at hand. A co-worker remembers fondly when he visited individually with a migratory student who was at risk of dropping out of school. The administrator from the school district contacted Region 8 to highlight the impact Mr. Beles had on that student. Eventually, the student graduated from high school and even participated in the ESC's MEP Close Up trip to Washington, D.C.

Mr. Beles is well liked and respected across Texas, but his largest impact is in his area of Texas where he grew up as a migratory child, recruited for the migrant education program, and became a MEP consultant and later a Federal Programs Director. It is here that he made his home, invested in his community, and, along with his wife Eva, raise their two daughters. His co-workers and staff value his opinion, insights, and his sharp sense of humor (he is so punny!) while mentioning his love for data and spreadsheets.

Lisa Ragsdale, ESC-20, Educator

Lisa Ragsdale has demonstrated her commitment to ensuring that migratory students in rural and remote communities of ESC Region 20 have access to supplemental instruction in basic skills to compensate for academic deficiencies inherent in a highly mobile population. She goes to great lengths every day to help her students. Anyone who has witnessed a tutor lesson of Ms. Ragsdale's knows it is about much more than just improving grades. Ms. Ragsdale helps students believe in themselves, enjoy their learning, and achieve what they are capable of – in the classroom, at home and in life. She explains things in a way students understand, which helps them through their educational journeys. As well as being a powerful role model for her students, one of the biggest impacts she has is in building up their confidence. Her students feel safe asking as many questions as they like and go over tricky topics as many times as they need until they've got it nailed. Ms. Ragsdale knows that by encouraging her students every step of the way, celebrating their small and big wins, and encouraging them as individuals, they can achieve their full potential.

Ms. Ragsdale also understands and values the critical role parents and community play in a student's success. Her enthusiasm and collaborative approach have encouraged and strengthened parents' participation in their children's education.

Dianna Diaz 38 Years of Service



Margot Balderas and Dianna Diaz have been part of the Migrant Education Program literally their entire lives. Their parents came to the US from Guanajuato, Mexico, and due to their lack of education and English language, they began doing field work to survive. As a result, the two sisters began doing migratory work at a very young age.

Dianna and Margot have many memories of being in the fields with their parents. They remember being young girls riding on top of the long sack their mother would pull while she picked cotton by hand. They remember migrating to Texarkana and staying in their truck because no housing was available. (As young children, they feared Bigfoot would get them.) They remember spending summers in Kinsey, Montana, weeding sugar beets and in Coloma, Wisconsin, working in the cucumber fields.

At some point, the family began routinely migrating to Dimmitt, Texas, where the entire family worked in the cucumber fields. If the cucumbers still needed growing time, the family would hoe cotton and clip onions. Many mornings, Margot and Dianna would shine the truck headlights on the fields to see the onions because they began working so early. Then after a long day of work, Dianna and Margot would return to the migrant camp in Dimmitt to sleep on the floor because no beds were available.

Returning to their hometown of Batesville, Texas, did not exempt them from field work. During the spring season, Dianna and Margot would work in the cucumber fields each day after school and on weekends. They would pick, load, and haul the cucumbers to the shed, often waiting until late into the night to unload the sacks. They teasingly say they are cucumber experts because of all their time in the cucumber fields.

In addition to cucumbers, Margot and Dianna worked in spinach, onions, cabbage, cantaloupe, cotton, lettuce, carrots, and corn. As long as work needed to be done, they were involved year-round; during school holidays, after school, weekends, and summers.

After high school graduation, both Dianna and Margot enrolled at Southwest Texas Junior College. Dianna would go on to earn an Associates of Arts in Elementary Education. Later, in 1983, Dianna gained employment in the Migrant Education Program at Uvalde CISD where she worked as a recruiter. She used her life experiences as a former migratory child and worker, in addition to her extensive community networks, to actively identify and recruit migratory families in the area. A few years later, her sister Margot joined the district. In 1993, when Dianna became the NGS data specialist (now TX-NGS), Margot joined the Uvalde CISD MEP as a recruiter. By 2001, Margot joined Dianna and became the second NGS data specialist for the district.

Over the course of their many years of service to the Migrant Education Program, Dianna and Margot have become the very face of the Uvalde CISD MEP. They split the duties of identification and recruitment of migratory families and the data entry duties. Most important, they make a point of connecting with every migratory family in their community. Whether they are helping connect an out-of-school youth to support services, aiding a family with school enrollment questions, or following up on MSIX move notices, their livelihood is based upon the powerful idea that migrant life helped them to appreciate and understand the hardships that our migratory families endure because they, too, have experienced it.

Both Dianna and Margot are quite meticulous about their work and understand that for every family they recruit, data must be encoded perfectly so that appropriate funding is ensured to support the individual needs of the migratory students. Because they understand the value and importance of accurate records, they attend every training session available at the local, state, and national levels so that they can stay current on all changes to data entry and identification and recruitment. They ask questions when clarification is warranted, they take notes at every opportunity, and they ensure they have precise information so that their data is encoded perfectly. Margot and Dianna exemplify dedication, conscientiousness, and hard work.

Says Dianna, "Thanks to our parents, we got to experience hard work, but in the end, we learned to appreciate everything."


In addition to describing some of the ID&R Strategies taught during the classroom, this session will demonstrate how to conduct ID&R training remotely with a variety of participants.

HEP and CAMP are free educational programs which serve students from migrant or seasonal farm-worker families. HEP helps students who have dropped out of high school get their High School Equivalency Credential and serves more than 6,000 students annually. These two programs, which have achieved stunning success rates since their inception, are funded through grants from the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Migrant Education and are administered by universities, colleges, and non-profit organizations nationwide.
